Day 1: Tour starts in Delhi train to Gangapur: The tour starts at our joining hotel in time for lunch. Our train departs at 4pm so you may decide to just freshen up and relax. The four hour journey arrives in the evening and we will spend the night in Karauli.

Day 2: In Karauli: Today is a slow paced day where we can hop on our bikes and explore this remote area. The colonial-style palace in which we are staying was built in 1938 and options for today include the 600 year old city where we can see local handicraft shops then go to see the 500 year old city palace full of frescos, fine stone carvings & paintings.

Day 3: Karauli - Ramathra: Today we will start with a four-hour cycle through rural landscapes to the wonderful Ramathra Fort. This amazing property is in a beautiful rural setting and after lunch we can pay a visit to some of the local tribes that live in the villages surrounding the fort. Many of these are of the Meena community, a caste who believe themselves descended from the Matsya Avatar, or fish incarnation of Vishnu. We can also visit the cave temples that lie hidden among the foothills of the Aravali ranges, before enjoying a boat ride and glorious sunset.

Approx 4 hours cycling

Ramathra Fort Camp (B,L,D)

Day 4: Ramathra - Ranthambore: Today our adventure begins in earnest. After

breakfast we embark on our bicycles once more to explore the local villages and scenic countryside of this little visited part of Rajasthan. After cycling for a few hours we will enjoy a picnic lunch before continuing on to Ranthambore National Park, one of the largest and most renowned reserves in northern India. The former hunting grounds of the Maharajas of Jaipur, the park lies at the edge of a plateau that is bounded by the Banas and Chambai Rivers. One of the country's famous 'Project Tiger' sanctuaries, the park is now one of the best places around to observe these magnificent animals.

Approx 4-6 hours cycling

Hotel (B,L,D)

Day 5: Ranthambore: Ranthambore covers over 390 square kilometres and, besides its large tiger population, is also home to leopard, nilgai, hyena and sloth bear. An early start sees us enjoying a morning safari in search of some of the park's famed residents, before returning to our hotel for a late breakfast. After a chance to then spend the heat of the day relaxing by the hotel's pool or enjoying some sightseeing around the local area, we will head out again after lunch to undertake another jeep safari around the area. Due to its varied terrain and abundance of water, the park also hosts a rich collection of birdlife, with some 272 species being recorded here including bee-eaters, hornbills and the great crested grebe.

Day 6: Ranthambore - Bundi: Following breakfast this morning we continue to explore the scenic landscapes of Rajasthan by bicycle, heading towards the famous fort at Indergarh. Surrounded by the Aravali Hills, the fort and its various temples once lay at the heart of the Jat principality of Indergarh, before their fall from grace at the hands of the Marathas in the early 19th century saw the region's overlords forced into exile. Stopping to enjoy a picnic lunch at the spot, we then continue towards Bundi and our charming boutique hotel, a 300 year old haveli built against the rampart walls of the Bundi Garh Palace.

Approx 4-5 hours cycling

Hotel (B,L,D)

Day 7: In Bundi: A morning's exploration of the town of Bundi sees us enjoying the

delights of the old town, including its ornate palace and the city's famous stepwell reservoirs known as baoris. Located on a hillside, close to the impressive Taragarh Fort, the palace dates back to the 17th and 18th centuries and presents visitors with a classic example of Rajasthani architecture. Famed for its excellent Bundi murals and frescoes, the palace provides us with a dazzling insight into the lives of Bundi's once powerful rulers. Following our sightseeing we will then enjoy a cookery demonstration, which will be followed by lunch at a local Brahmin's house, after which you will be free to enjoy exploring the town at your own pace.

Day 8: Bundi - Doria Ka Talab: Departing Bundi after breakfast we drive into the deep gorges and forests that lie to the south of the city, to visit the Menal temples and their famous erotic sculptures. This rocky stronghold was once the mountain retreat of Prithvi Raj Chauhan and the region is littered with a collection of fascinating temples that span the 7th to 10th centuries. Following a picnic lunch we then begin our trek towards our overnight camp, a four hour walk that takes us through a landscape rich in flora and fauna and remote rural villages. A gentle walk, the 20 kilometre trek will finally bring us to a lakeside tented camp at Doria Ka Talab, where we will be spending the night.

Approx 4 hours walking

Tented Camp (B,L,D)

Day 9: Doria Ka Talab - Ranawato Ka Khera: Leaving camp this morning we head next for the village of Tejpura, home to the Bhils tribe. Famed for their fighting skills, these people once filled the ranks of the local militia, serving their erstwhile rulers during attacks from the Moghul armies. Today they devote their time to more serene activities, working the land in an area that is famous for its opium growing and its home-made liquor. We will take lunch today in a local village, before continuing to our tented camp at Ranawato Ka Khera. The total distance for the trek today will be around 22 kilometres, but for those that do not wish to trek there will be an option to utilise our back-up jeeps to reach the overnight stop.

Approx 5 hours walking

Tented Camp (B,L,D)

Day 10: Ranawato Ka Khera - Pangarh Lake: A final morning's trekking sees us taking lunch at one of the local villages that we pass through, before we then take our jeeps on to the lotus lake at Pangarh. Wonderfully scenic, the lake and its surroundings is home to an old fort and a collection of ancient temples that can trace their ancestry back to the Mouraya dynasty of the 8th century. Now owned by the Bijaipur Family, descendants of the old Hada rulers, our luxury tented camp sits beside the waters of the lake and this afternoon we have an opportunity to take a stroll up to the old fort to enjoy a stunning sunset and some sundowners before dinner.

Approx 3-4 hours walking

Tented Camp (B,L,D)

Day 11: Pangarh Lake - Bijaipur: This morning we visit the village of Tarapur, famous for its hand block printing work, where the local people use completely natural dyes to prepare their colours. Following our visit we will then take lunch with the royal family of Athana in their palace, before continuing on to the delightful heritage property of Castle Bijaipur, a former 17th century fort that is owned and run by our great friend Rao Narendra Singh, the Prince of Bijaipur. Narendra once ruled over some 90 villages in the surrounding area and his knowledge of the people and their traditions is without parallel. Hopefully we will be able to benefit from some of Narendra's extensive insight later, with a personal introduction to some of the colourful customs of the region.

NB, There may be the option to take a horse ride from the lake to Castle Bijaipur for a supplement of approx \$75.

Hotel (B,L,D)

Day 12: In Bijaipur: Today presents us with one of the real highlights of our journey, a visit to the village of the Gujjar 'milkman' tribe. Spending much of the day with these fascinating people, we will gain an opportunity to learn something of their culture and activities, watching them milking their animals and helping them to turn the fresh milk into lassi. After a local lunch, served to us on a banana leaf plate, we will then spend the afternoon relaxing amongst the tribe, learning more of their customs before a

traditional opium ceremony in the village concludes our visit. Later this evening we will visit a local farm, where dinner has been arranged by our Bijaipur hosts.

Day 13: Bijaipur - Chittorgarh - Udaipur: After breakfast we will pay a visit to a local school that is supported by Wild Frontiers, following this up with a trip to a local plantation, before returning to the Castle for lunch. This afternoon we will then make preparations for our return to Delhi, transferring first to Chittorgarh, home to the great 7th century Rajput fortress, whose mighty walls still dominate the city today from the top of a 180 metre hill. From here we will then Transfer to Udaipur for a final day of R&R.

Day 14: Udaipur: Udaipur is a place best explored at one's own pace. Guides and itineraries will be available for those wishing to have a more structured tour of this beautiful city's sights but the old town is small, made up of a labyrinth of alleyways and passages, and getting lost is part of the fun! Dinner will be at a local lakeside restaurant.

Day 15: Tour ends in Udaipur: The tour this morning at the hotel. (B)

Wild Extensions:

Arrive early to adjust to a new time zone or just to get a feel for the country before your tour starts. Explore the country after your tour on a bespoke Wild Extension or just allow a few days to relax afterwards. Maybe choose all of the above and get cheaper flights mid-week?

Accommodation In Rajasthan you will experience some of the finest accommodation the subcontinent can offer. From wonderful converted palaces, castles and forts to smart tented camps and luxury hotels - you will not be disappointed. Indeed the accommodation that one uses in Rajasthan is one of the main joys of visiting the land of Kings. However this is still India and in certain forts facilities are sometimes not quite up to a Western standard and therefore patience is occasionally required.

Any accommodation mentioned in the itinerary is subject to availability and if not available substitutes will be of a similar quality.

Transport will be in jeeps, minibus coasters, bikes, boat and our own two feet.

Anyone in a reasonable state of health will enjoy this trip, although obviously clients should feel comfortable on a bicycle and be happy to walk for 6 to 7 hours a day.

While cycling from point to point there will always be vehicle back up should people be struggling for any reason.

It may sound obvious but...

Wild Frontiers tours are not always for everyone and it is important to us that the tour you choose is the most suitable. Please therefore take time to read the dossier carefully. All our tours are graded to give an overall picture of the trip but these are only guidelines and you should check the daily itinerary. Should you have any concerns about your ability to partake in any aspect of the tour then please contact the office.

Insurance: Insurance that provides cover for emergency repatriation in case of a medical emergency is compulsory for all tours. You should be aware that many standard insurance policies may not cover you adequately for all aspects of a Wild Frontiers trip and so we strongly recommend that you purchase a suitably designed insurance policy. One such policy is the "Wild Frontiers" policy underwritten by Travel & General Insurance Company plc, which is available to UK and Republic of Ireland residents through our website or via the insurance company direct on 0845 408 0583. Under this policy there are two different levels of cover available and for this trip the minimum requirement would be the Standard policy.

Cover explained:

Standard policy: a comprehensive travel insurance policy that provides cover for all Wild Frontiers activities, including trekking up to 6,000m. This policy does not provide cover for travel to areas

where the FCO is advising against all or all but essential travel.

Elite policy: provides the same comprehensive level of cover as the standard policy. In addition the Elite policy also provides cover for travel to areas where the FCO is advising against all or all but essential travel. The policy will not provide cover for any claims arising from or relating to the reasons why the FCO is advising against travel.

If purchasing the Elite policy you also have the option to **extend the cover** provided by the policy to include cover for claims arising from a terrorist act in an area where the FCO is advising against travel. You can add this cover to your policy when purchasing online or over the telephone.

These policies are only available to those travelling on a Wild Frontiers holiday.

With plenty more sight-seeing trips available to the Qutab Minar, Lodhi Gardens, the Lotus Temple or the awesome Humayan's Tomb - inspiration for the Taj Mahal; shopping expeditions on Janpath, Santoshti or Khan Markets; or a quiet cup of tea at the Imperial... Delhi can have you busy for days.



INDIA - THE FACTS



Delhi: Capital of modern India, of the British Raj and the Moghul empire, Delhi - the City of Djinns - is a fascinating place to explore, bursting with centuries of colourful history, of old imperial splendour and modern manic mayhem. From the chaotic, narrow alleyways of the old town to the relative tranquility of the new, at almost every corner there is something - a fort, a mosque, an imperial palace - to excite and amaze the visitor. To wander unhindered down Rajpath - the Kingsway - from India Gate to Rajpati Bhrevan, stopping for a while

Ranthambore: Standing a few kilometres from the railway at Sawai Madhopur, Ranthambore lies in some beautiful virgin jungle country on the eastern edge of Rajasthan under the Aravali and Vindhya Hills. Originally a hunting ground of the Maharaja of Jaipur, Ranthambore was declared a game sanctuary in 1955. In the 1980s, it became a national park and was listed among the reserves protected under Project Tiger (1973).

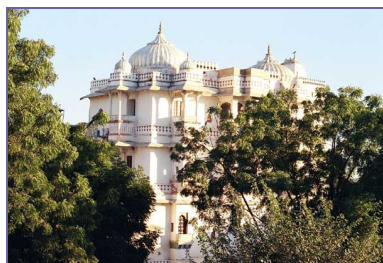
Presently the Kaila Devi Sanctuary, also famous for its tigers, and the Man Singh Sanctuary form a part of Ranthambore Reserve. While it is most famous for its tigers it is also full of a huge variety of other species of other birds and mammals and it is worth being reminded, to avoid disappointment that as ever with wild animals, there is no guarantee of seeing a tiger.

Bundi: In 1193 A.D. when Sultan Mohammed Ghauri defeated Prithviraj Chauhan, some Chauhan nobles sought shelter in Mewar and became allies to the Rana while other young warriors moved towards the Chambal Valley and

overpowered the Meena and Bhil tribals - thus establishing their own kingdom of Hadoti. Later, two branches of Hadas formed two separate states of Kota and Bundi, on either side of the river Chambal. Bundi is surrounded by the Aravalli hills on three sides and is circumscribed by a massive wall with four gateways. It is a truly medieval city in great condition benefiting from being off the main tourist routes.



Bijaipur and the villages of the district: With a third of all international tourists to India travelling to Rajasthan, visiting the Land of Kings can leave you with the rather deflating feeling of being little more than one of a crowd. This doesn't have to be. At Wild Frontiers we try our hardest to make your trip, wherever it may be, as unique and unusual as possible, leaving you feeling special. Therefore we have gone to all lengths possible to seek out the more secret places, off the beaten track, that we think show you the other side to this colourful state: unspoilt rural villages, out of the way temples and lakes, remote trekking and wildlife safaris and sensational family-run heritage hotels. And of all of these we feel Castle Bijaipur is the best and it is here, and the picturesque villages that lie nearby, that form the focus of all our Village India trips.



Udaipur: If you were to ask the staff of Wild Frontiers - all of whom have spend a considerable amount of time in India - which was their favourite town on the

Subcontinent, you would almost certainly receive the answer, Udaipur. As romantic as any city on earth - with its hilltop forts, city palaces, tranquil lakes and quiet alleyways - it is not without justification that it has been called the Venice of the East. Founded in 1568 by Maharana Udai Singh, Udaipur rivals any of the world-famous creations of the Moghuls with its Rajput love of the whimsical and its superbly crafted elegance. The Lake Palace is certainly the best example of this unique cultural explosion, but Udaipur is full of palaces, temples and havelis ranging from the modest to the extravagant. To wander around this town is simply a joy.
